Soon-Mi Choi, Assistant Professor, Department of Athletic Training & Exercise Physiology, is a coauthor on a recent scientific publication, "Co-ingestion of carbohydrate and whey protein increases fasted rates of muscle protein synthesis immediately after resistance exercise in rats." The article is in *PLoS One*. 2017 Mar. 15;12(3).

The Louise Hopkins Underwood Center for the Arts (LHUCA) in Lubbock, Texas, has commissioned **Dr. Ann Marie Leimer** to produce an exhibition essay for the upcoming show, "LatinX: Artistas de Tejas," that opens April 7. "LatinX: Artistas de Tejas" is dedicated to the recognition and celebration of artists living and working in Texas who are of Mexican ancestry. Dr. Leimer will give a gallery talk April 8 in conjunction with the exhibition opening.

William Ash, a junior double major in Accounting and Finance, was one of 39 students selected nationwide to make an oral presentation at the Economics Scholars Program for Undergraduate Research sponsored by the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas on March 31 in Dallas. His presentation was titled, "On the Effect of Remittances on Poverty through Human Capital in Developing Countries: Are Developing Regions Different?" Another student, **Kevin Thompson**, a senior Economics/Finance major, had a poster abstract. Their mentor was **Dr. Pablo Garcia-Fuentes**, Assistant Professor of Economics.

Fourteen students and four faculty members from the Dillard College of Business attended the conference.
