IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Fourteen students from the McCoy School of Engineering recently presented their research projects at the National Society of Black Engineers' (NSBE) 45th Annual Convention, in Detroit, Michigan, March 27-31. The NSBE is a not-for-profit organization founded in 1975 to promote and support globally diverse technical talent. NSBE is one of the largest student-managed organizations

in the world and is dedicated to the academic and professional success of black engineering students and professionals worldwide. NSBE has more than 35,000 members and more than 300 chapters in the U.S. and abroad. NSBE's National Convention is designed to provide attendees with the motivation, skills and opportunity to succeed in their future engineering endeavors. On April 1, UGROW 2018 scholars **Tyler Jones** and **Kameron Shrum**, along with their mentor **Fu-Cheng Liang**, presented their research project "Deciphering the Mechanism of Protein Targeting Mechanism in Chloroplast" at the Texas Undergraduate Research Day at the Capitol, in Austin. Using the theme "Transforming Texas through Undergraduate Research" the event provided universities from around the state the opportunity to showcase the experiences of undergraduate students engaged in research to Texas legislators and the public through high-quality poster presentations.

Debra Wynne, Rodney Fisher, Vicki Sanders, and **Beth Vealé** attended the annual Oklahoma Society of Radiologic Technologists annual meeting in Midwest Cities, Oklahoma, March 29-30. Fisher presented two topics: "Legal Terms and the Suits No RT Wants to Wear (Keynote)" and "Radiation Exposed! Martyrs of Radiation Incidents and the Resulting Lesions." Sanders presented two topics: "Diagnosing Historical Maladies in the Present Day" and "Thyroid Pathology and Performance of Ultrasound Guided FNA." Vealé also presented two topics: "I Need to Talk to You: Crucial Conversations" and "Osteogenesis Imperfecta."

Nathan Jun, Associate Professor and Coordinator of the Philosophy Program, recently published a book chapter titled “Deleuze and the Anarchist Tradition” in *Deleuze and Anarchism*, ed. A. Eloff and C. Gray van der Heerden (Edinburgh University Press, 2019); an article titled “Anarchism Without Archives” in *American Periodicals: A Journal of History and Criticism* 29, no. 1 (2019); and a review of Iwona Janicka’s *Theorizing Contemporary Anarchism: Solidarity, Mimesis and Radical Social Change in Anarchist Studies* 27, no. 1 (2019).

Dittika Gupta, Assistant Professor in the West College of Education, conducted professional development for San Diego area teachers on April 1 on integrating technology for teaching mathematics. The workshop was attended by almost 40 elementary teachers working in the neighboring school districts. She also presented at the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics Research conference with her colleagues from Iowa, Bucknell, and San Diego on “MTEs Learning through Lesson Study: A Community of Practice Perspective.”

Steve Hilton, Associate Professor of Art, participated on the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts (NCECA) Roundtable Discussion in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Hilton took eight students to the four-day international ceramic conference with five students participating by volunteering their services to NCECA.

Eric Lynch, Assistant Professor of French, recently presented a paper titled “War and Cataclysm in Jean-Yves Jouannais” at the 20th- and 21st-Century French and Francophone Studies International Colloquium in Oklahoma City.
