About Sherry Anne Gill Gillespie

Sherry Anne Gill Gillespie joined the Midwestern State University faculty in the fall of 1967, at a time when the administration had little interest in supporting women's athletics. Undeterred by the general condition, the young college teacher from Fort Worth began to organize sports programs for women because as she said, "Women should have the opportunity to compete in intercollegiate sports too." Although her focus shifted to other areas when Title IX came into force she kept a close watch from the sidelines. She retired from MSU Texas in December 1996.


